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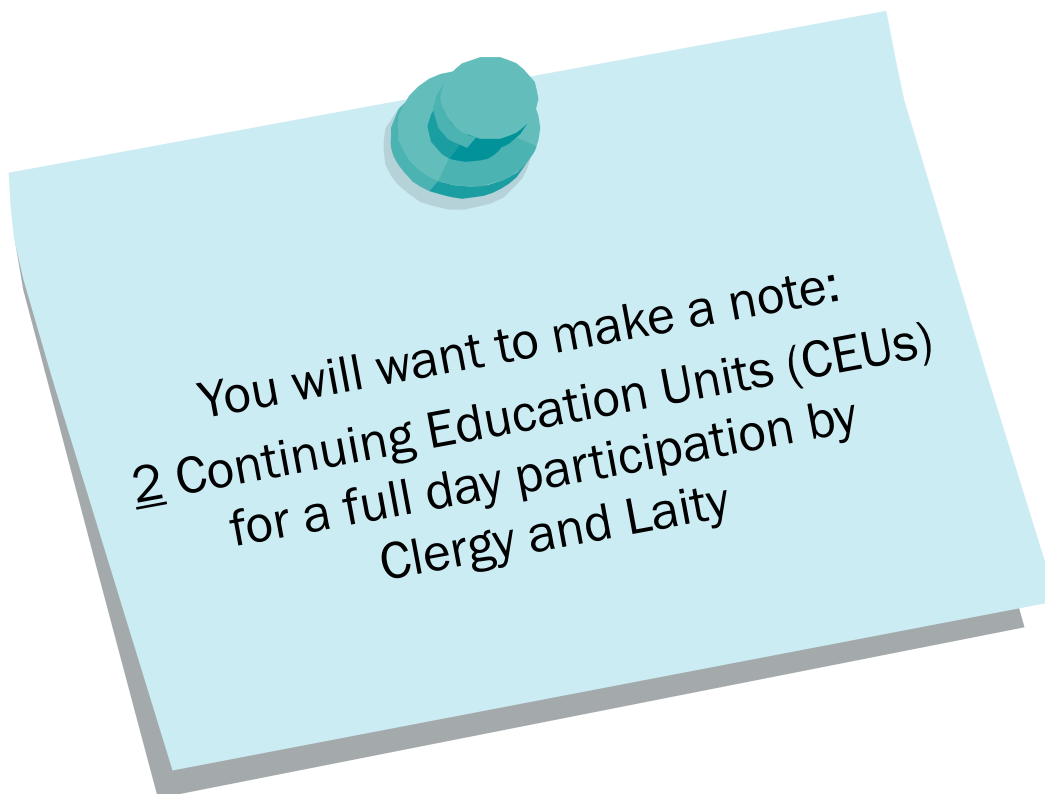

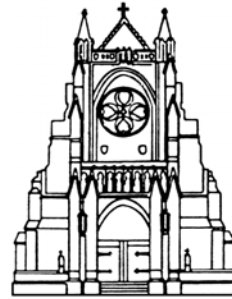

► **TBLG Concerns and Anglican Identity**

Session I

It is our embrace of the Anglican approach to the Christian faith that has led many of us to support the equality of all believers in the diversities of gender identities and sexual orientation. At the same time, The Episcopal Church may be kicked out of the Anglican Communion for its stance on non-discrimination. How is it that we find such conflicting interpretations of Anglicanism? How does our Anglican tradition help us to understand how to be most faithful in the midst of this conflict?

The Rev. Canon Gary Hall has been the Rector of Christ Church Cranbrook since January, 2010. Prior to that he was Dean and President and Professor of Anglican Studies at Seabury-Western Theological Seminary in Evanston, IL. Gary is editor, along with Ruth Meyers, of "Christian Holiness and Human Sexuality", a collection of essays on Anglicanism and same sex relationships forthcoming from Church Publishing in the Spring.

Not long ago Congregational Development officer C. Kirk Hadaway addressed the House of Bishops saying that one of the biggest reasons Episcopal churches were declining was because they did not follow up on visitors who attended services. Hadaway said there was no consistent framework in place, no conscientious effort on the part of most Episcopal parishes to value and tend to newcomers. In this course we will examine newcomer welcoming strategies, asking participants to bring with them their existing strategies and materials. We will discuss the materials participants bring and look at 'best' practices and 'possible' practices with hopes that those who attend will leave with new ideas and strategies they can incorporate into their own ministry contexts.

Session I

The Worldviews Seminar, now in its tenth year, will be held on the University of Michigan-Dearborn campus from June 20-25, 2011. The seminar was created through a grant from the Episcopal Church USA in the aftermath of the events of September 11, 2001. This course, now a part of the University's offerings, is to provide people in contemporary multi-religious America foundational information about beliefs and practices of several of the world's religions sufficient to engage in inter-religious dialogue of: Baha'i, Buddhism, Chinese & Japanese Traditional Religious, Christianity, First People's & Native Traditions, Hinduism, Islam, Jainism, Judaism, Sikhism, Zoroastrianism, and to explore different models of dialogue. Seminar participants come from a wide variety of backgrounds, including college and university students, seminarians, and community residents who are leaders in their congregations or simply have an interest in religions of the world. Through time in the classroom and field trips to religious centers (transportation provided), this seminar places an emphasis on what people believe and do, in order to make the world meaningful.

All Episcopal parishes say they want to grow, but they behave as if they don't. In this workshop, Gary will share what he has learned from his years studying church growth principles, applying them at All Saints, Pasadena, and teaching in the D.Min. program in Congregational Development at Seabury-Western Theological Seminary. The goal of congregational development is to help a congregation function creatively and effectively in the community it serves. Some congregations are limited by the size and natures of their communities, but all congregations can be more effective at attracting and retaining new members than they usually are.

SESSION II WORKSHOPS: 10:30 a.m.—11:45 a.m.**► From Zero to a Dozen: How We Grew Our Sunday School from Nothing!**

Session II

Four years ago, St. John's in Clinton had no children. Most of the members were in their fifties and sixties, and their children had moved away. But the congregation believed that children are the future, not just for their church, but for the Episcopal Church and for Christianity in general. The leadership decided that they needed a plan to attract and educate children. Two women, a retired school teacher and a retired librarian, volunteered to design a curriculum and teach. The next issue was space. With the retirement of their priest had come the decision to lease the rectory, which meant that space for Sunday School would be limited to the large, open parish hall; previously, Sunday School classes had met in the rectory. With no children attending, the congregation applied for and received a grant from the Diocese to install room dividers, creating three classroom spaces in the parish hall. Then, the whole church worked to spread the word. Sunday School was available every week, whether there was one child or five. Slowly, families started to hear about the program. The numbers grew. On Easter last year, we had 18 children! Typically, we have 8-12. A young couple (who started coming because their kids attended Sunday School) has just volunteered to start a youth group! Right now, we only have three "youth," but who knows, in a few years, we may have a couple dozen! Join us to find out how (and why!) we did it.

The Episcopal Church has entered into a partnership with the interfaith GreenFaith Certification Program (<http://greenfaith.org/>) to encourage participation. St. Aidan's, Ann Arbor was one of the first Episcopal churches to take advantage of the tuition subsidy and was the first church of any denomination in Michigan to join the GreenFaith Certification Program. This workshop will describe the four aspects of the program: Spirit, Stewardship, Justice, and Communications and how they relate to the Commitments to Mission and Ministry of the RSVP Initiative. In particular, we will show how Congregational Development is supported by reaching out to those who share Episcopal values regarding stewardship of the earth, how environmental justice is inextricably linked with Social Justice, and how Spiritual and practical environmental education play a role in Vibrant Christian Formation.

We will also discuss the longstanding commitment to environmental stewardship at St. Aidan's and how it brought us to the GreenFaith Certification Program as well as how we are moving forward with the program.
